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We have also spent some time scrutinising plans and impact reports for pupil premium and recovery spending. The panel, whose role it is to quality assure these, is chaired by an independent expert, Deb Wring. Deb is an experienced Ofsted inspector and school improvement partner so it is a rigorous process. We were all similarly struck by the ambition and compassion for the most vulnerable children and the quality of strategies to support them in our schools on display.

I would further like to extend a very warm welcome to Barbara Manning who has joined the Trust for one day a week as Safeguarding Lead. Barbara's substantive role is a Director of Educational Welfare and Safeguarding for Dartmoor Multi-Academy Trust.

Barbara has been an educational professional for thirty years, originally training as a teacher of RS/PSHE and working in the secondary phase, in five schools, in London, Lancashire and Devon. Since then, Barbara has been a middle leader, an Advanced Skills Teacher and a senior leader. In addition, Barbara spent two years in higher education as a senior lecturer in initial teacher education and programme lead for National Professional Qualifications at the University of Cumbria. Her last school-based post was as Vice Principal of a large cooperative Devon secondary school and Barbara is also Chair of Governors for an alternative provision setting in Devon.



Barbara explains that "safeguarding is my absolute raison d'etre – I care deeply about people, relationships, well-being and welfare and doing the right thing for the right reason. To quote Khalil Gibran; "safeguarding the rights of others is the most noble and beautiful end of a human being"

We are very privileged to have Barbara assisting us on such an important aspect of our work and are very grateful to Dartmoor for supporting this appointment. She will be instrumental in facilitating cross school working and setting up networks of support for DSLs and DDSLs. It is really exciting to see our plans for collaboration being enacted across the Trust. As we are able to make more appointments to the central team, we will, I am sure, start to properly realise the true benefits of partnership.





Visitors have also come to the school this term to work with our students, both in Science where a group took part in an engaging and informative day learning about Henrietta Leavitt's contributions to astronomy, and in Drama, which had a visit from the Paper Birds theatre company. This company performed their latest show 'Broke' to GCSE Drama students and Gifted and Talented Year 9 students. Watching the show and working with the actors not only equipped students with the knowledge and understanding needed for the GCSE written exam but helped to inspire and develop their own devising skills, supporting the remaining elements of their practical Drama work.

At the end of the Summer Term, KS3 pupils took part in the annual House Writing Competition, The Cameron Cup, dedicated to the memory of past Head of English, David Cameron. This year's theme was 'Things for which we are proud'. There were hundreds of wonderful entries and it was incredible to hear pupils writing about their own achievements, which can actually be quite challenging to share publicly. Earlier in the term the Languages department celebrated the importance and diversity of native languages which we have here at school and throughout the world during their Loving Languages Week. Years 7 and 8 were treated to an assembly presented by students
